

Are We Still Teaching the Faith?

In this age of COVID, it seems a lot of things have come to a halt or at the very least have been modified in how we



experience them. The formalized teaching of the faith through catechism instruction is no exception. Now to be clear, if for some reason the Church were to be completely unavailable to partner in this task, parents, baptismal sponsors and the like are still responsible for

this teaching of the faith as it is presented in the catechism. It may seem an insurmountable task but in truth, there are only six parts: the Ten Commandments, Apostles' Creed, Lord's Prayer, Baptism, Confession and Absolution and the Lord's Supper. Of course, learning and growing in the faith isn't just for kids; all of us would be blessed by a review of what we believe. Don't have a copy of Luther's Small Catechism? You can find the catechism in the front of our two most recent hymnals and even on line at http://catechism.cph.org.

Thankfully through technology, Immanuel continues to offer formalized confirmation instruction. Last March
when we had to immediately stop meeting in person, we had a
variety of electronic ways (Zoom, Google Classroom, prerecorded videos) that allowed us to finish up the year's
instruction for 5th-8th grade. Finally in late June, the 8th grade
confirmands were able to share their essays pre-recorded via
You Tube and we were able to hold an in person service for the
public Rite of Confirmation and First Communion of our 10
confirmands. (*cont*)

In 2020, for the first time since beginning Confirmation Camp, camp was cancelled.

Jump to September 2020; Confirmation class for 5th-8th grade is now back in session and looking just a little bit different than most might remember. The first noticeable change is the meeting time. With service times and limits of who can be in the building when as well as family travel to and from church, there was not an optimum window of time to meet between services, so **our new meeting time is 5:00 pm on Sunday evenings.**

The other change is a move to "in person" learning through Zoom. Our current 6th graders finished up their 5th grade Bible Overview year with Miss Natalie Oleshchuk via Zoom learning but this is a first for our 6th-8th grades with a group total of 34 students. While this format allows for the presentation of the material, it is not so conducive for class discussion, so parents please take time to be a part of your child's learning, after all this is important stuff. To assist you, there are various helps and resources that we will make available to your families, either leading into the lessons or something to help with the review after. One of the best (and maybe the easiest) ways that parents might help is to show interest and ask your child about their lesson each week; let your kids know that what they are learning and doing is important to you.

Don't forget, the faithful example of parents, grandparents and other adults in the family is still the best influence when it comes to teaching your child what faith in Jesus is and what it looks like. May God bless and guide all of us (young and old alike) in this endeavor of learning and growing in the Christian faith.

From the Vicar

There are 168 hours in a week. It seems like a lot, but when we begin to add up our daily responsibilities, we suddenly find ourselves running out of time. Work takes up most of our time.

If you are a parent, then you have to factor in play dates or school, practices, and any extracurricular activity. By the time we want to spend time focusing on our spiritual growth, we are too tired. Out of the 168 hours a week, most of us might only spend 1 hour on Sunday dedicated to worship. Although I do encourage attending weekly worship, this 1 hour doesn't seem to compensate for the other 167 hours in the week. If God desires us to be daily in His Word and meditating on His message, how can we better utilize our time to expand our worship beyond 1 hour a week?

Family Messages

Due to the pandemic, church services as we know them have drastically transformed. Livestream, masks, 6 foot seating, and no common cup are just the beginning. However, because safety has become the number one priority, Children's Messages have been removed from the service to keep them at a safe distance from each other. Nevertheless, out of this situation, Family Messages were born. A short message recorded and posted on Youtube for the children to enjoy and listen to. Now the production of these messages is nothing to brag about, but then, they were created to provide opportunities for kids to get into the Word and families to create further discussion.

Our Hope

It can be challenging to find time for a devotional. Balancing your schedule with your spouse takes a lot of coordination. And balancing your schedule with the different kids' schedules seems impossible. However, our hope is that even during this time we could provide opportunities for devotion outside of church. Take time to talk about the family message at the dinner table, or during your commute to school. Watching and discussing the family messages do not have to be a labor intensive devotion. They are there to help spark conversation and keep the whole family in God's Word.

Romans 15:4 states, "For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope." It takes a lot of endurance and strength to make it through each week. It requires all of our energy and all of our attention. But God encourages us to seek His Word. The Bible is not just some historical book, but a book that is living and active that gives hope to the weary. It gives hope for a better tomorrow; it gives hope for a better future in Christ.

Partnering with Families to Prepare God's Children for the Future <u>Immanuel Lutheran School's Mission</u>

Responding to God's grace through Christ, Assisting families with whole child development, and Preparing children for God's service.

At the time of preparing this article we have completed 20 days with no cases of Covid-19 among our



students and staff. We thank God for daily reminding all of us that He is in control of all things. If you are wondering about the work occurring behind the scenes, allow me to share the intricacies of the investment of planning and the implementation of the plan. As the administrator, I run through worst case scenarios to act with the highest regard for the safety of the students and staff. After all, they are worth the responsibility of leading them well.

As for the teachers, I commend them for going above and beyond to provide lessons to students in the classroom and at home. It is much like two full-time

jobs simultaneously and a necessity to work well beyond 7:45 am - 3:45 pm. We currently have 29 of the 120 kindergarten to eighth grade students at home.

There are 19 preschoolers enrolled compared to beginning last year with 46 preschoolers. This year's preschool enrollment is 41% of the budget. Due to the decrease in enrollment, we have eliminated all aides during the school day. Cleaning and disinfecting during the school day was typically assigned to the aides. It is now the task of the teacher.

We thank our families for following the CDC and St. Louis County guidelines and the policies and procedures of the school. For parents who have children working from home, thank you, parents, for going above and beyond to partner with the teachers. We especially are grateful for how the students have adjusted to different ways of learning and growing. They are definitely working hard and advocating for their education in countless ways.

Members of Immanuel Lutheran Church and Light of Christ, please take time to thank and pray for your Immanuel Lutheran School faculty and staff as they continue to show God's kindness, gentleness, humbleness, and patience to the students and their families.

Thanksgiving Food Offering and Christmas Gift Collection

The ongoing COVID-19 virus continues to affect us all in many ways. The Community Care Team wants to continue some aspects of our Thanksgiving Food Offering and Christmas Gift Collection, but in a modified manner, since we cannot currently gather together and drop items off in the church building as we normally do. We typically collect non-perishable food items during the week of Thanksgiving and save them to deliver the week before Christmas along with a fresh ham and gifts from our Christmas collection. The dinners and gifts are given to families from the Lutheran Community Center at Transfiguration Lutheran Church in North St. Louis City, as well as several families from Nurses for Newborns.

This year, we're not going to collect the non-perishable items, since we can't drop off and collect items in the church building. However, the Community Care

Team will still purchase hams for the families for Christmas dinner and deliver them directly to the Lutheran Community Center. Instead of asking our members to sign up to sponsor a child's gift during the Fellowship time between services, the CCT is going to purchase Visa gift cards through PSCE for the Lutheran Community Center Director to use to purchase gifts for the children. The Director, Shirley Booker, will purchase all the gifts and have her team wrap and distribute the gifts. If any of our Immanuel members would like to support this collection by donating the customary \$25, you are welcome to participate in this way this year. Checks made out to Immanuel (with "CCT Donation" in the memo) can be mailed or dropped off at church on Sundays. We know that the families look forward to our dinners and gifts every year, and we aren't going to let COVID-19 stop us! Thank you for contributing to this program.

Voters' Highlights – Sept. 22, 2020

- The Voters' Meeting on Sept. 22 was held via Zoom with 47 families in attendance.
- The Treasurer's Report shows a current budget deficit of \$3,585. Offerings are lagging about \$25,000 behind budget and behind the status of one year ago.
- The Board of Elders expressed thanks to all the folks who have been working diligently behind the scenes to make worship safely available.
- The School Report included high commendation of the faculty and staff who are pulling together to do more than they ever thought they'd have to do. The congregation is asked to also express personal appreciation to our teachers and staff members. Enrollment stands at 139 with the decrease due to far fewer preschoolers than last year (19 as opposed to 44). The first dine-out fundraiser will take place at Chipotle on Oct. 7.
- Parish Education said that Sunday School has resumed virtually at 9:30 am, with thanks to Mara Springer. The link can be found on Immanuel's website. Printed materials can be ordered to use at home if desired.
- The Board of Stewards reported that as of July 31, the 175th Anniversary Thank Offering was \$81,572.36. Dispersed funds so far are \$15,000 to missionaries, \$16,000 to technology, and \$6,000 to support two Light of Christ members in the Deaconess program at Concordia Seminary. A member of the Board will be speaking to the Youth Group about financial issues.
- Pastor Karg reported that the Senior Youth meet every Sunday evening, alternating between virtual and in-person. The Junior High Youth meet virtually every week. Two 6th grade mentors are needed, one man and one woman. If interested, please let Pastor know ASAP.
- Pastor Lim reported that Light of Christ is thriving an adult woman was baptized last week and gave a wonderful testimony; attendance at worship is good; youth are meeting weekly; the lay training class has 25-30 in attendance; 6 Bible classes are held during the week; there are 2 active prayer fellowships.
- Building and Grounds reported that after much time and effort, the water line leak in the East Building was finally found and repaired. Roofs are needed for the gym and for the East Building. Watch for information on timing for fall clean-up and please lend a hand.
- Church Council will need 17 persons to replace Board members whose terms are expiring. Please consider where you can step up to fill these positions.
- Under New Business, President Copeland announced that a Stump Budget would be adopted
 for the time period of January 1-June 30, 2021. This will carry Immanuel through this school
 year, which is very unique. From then on, the budget will follow the fiscal year of July-June.
 Prayerfully, next school year will return to a more normal status. Council is planning to
 include an Associate Pastor in the full year budget.
- New guidelines for use of Immanuel's gym (50 people) or fellowship hall (25 people) were announced. Gatherings must register and be approved at least 1 week in advance; no food or drink can be served; one hour is maximum time length; social distancing and masks mandatory; a written list of attendees required. See the guidelines on the website for further details.
- Pastor Karg ended the meeting with a plea for everyone to come to worship in-person at Immanuel! His wish is for Connie Baur to have so many requests that she must say "no" to someone. The Council can then add seating in the fellowship hall, etc. in order to accommodate all worshippers.

Light of Christ

Ever since the stay-at-home order was proposed, most would have thought that keeping everyone confined to their own homes would pose some problems for church attendance. Yet, in a seemingly counterintuitive turn of events, the pandemic seems to have encouraged even more people to join Light of Christ's Bible studies. During the past few months, Friday night Bible studies have been boasting an



average of over 30 attendees per week, while Sunday Bible studies have seen around 34 people for the three classes offered in total—English, Chinese, and Basics of Christianity, which serves as an introduction to the foundations of the Christian faith. These encouraging numbers prompted Pastor Lim to start an additional English Bible study class during the month of June, which is currently meeting on Friday nights to conduct an indepth study of Judges. On top of that, Pastor Lim is also leading a new discipleship training program on the third Saturday of

every month starting June. So far, an average 26 people have attended each month.

This surge in attendance may be due to the accessibility of technology; newcomers may be more encouraged to just click a link and be able to listen without the pressure of inserting themselves into a new environment. However, one group seemed to be left out; many of LOC's seniors had difficulties with the technological adjustment at first. Zoom, the primary application used by LOC to host Bible studies, posed a high learning curve for those who were less well-versed in technology. Combining this with a language barrier made tutorials difficult to follow without someone more experienced to walk the seniors through each step. Thus, once the stay-at-home order was relaxed, the Center Director, Helen, began personally visiting seniors' homes (following proper procedures, of course) to help them set up

and learn to use Zoom. As a result, the seniors' Bible study and fellowship has regained momentum; around 13 seniors were able to attend Thursday's Bible study classes after the visits, compared to the initial response of approximately 2-3 people. The additional participants have done wonders for the seniors' emotional wellness as well—they can finally find support in meeting together after months of isolation, and are delighted to be able to use this new technology to communicate with each other again.



From a global pandemic to frustrating technology, sometimes it seems as if the problems never stop. Yet, despite the unfavorable circumstances, God has still continued to carry out His will, turning what seems like adversity at first into a new advantage for the spread of the Word. No matter what happens, the past couple of months have made one thing clear—God will always find a way.

More great news for LOC is that we have two sisters, Kan Hsu and Helen Qiu enrolled in the EIIT (Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology) program at Concordia Seminary. They started their four-year Deaconess Program study in August. Both women are already serving faithfully in LOC for many years. The program will prepare them theologically and help them to serve more effectively. Please remember them in your prayers.

In spite of our imperfections and frailties, God wants to use us as His hands and feet to feed the hungry, house the homeless, build His Church, and seek the lost with His Gospel. God has made us His stewards, and He equips us for the task. The Apostle Paul wrote, "And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work" (2 Corinthians 9:8).

God doesn't expect us to be perfect stewards, but He expects us to have attitudes that desire to praise and serve Him. Jesus didn't say, "Blessed are those who achieve their potential and never make a mistake," nor did Jesus say, "Well done, good and successful servant." What Jesus did say was, "Blessed are the poor in spirit . . . those who mourn . . . the meek" (Matthew 5:3-5). He also said, "Well done, good and faithful servant" (Matthew 25:23). In our humanity, it is easy for us to make a mess of things, but we please the Lord when we, through faith, willingly use our time, talents, and treasures to help others and His Church. Then from across the table he heard an expression which should be inscribed over every business. "My friend, I have discovered that it is only when we do mix business and religion that we can prove our religion and improve our business."

Is this the time for you, like Paul, to put your own desires aside in order to be able to give donations missionaries, to your church colleges, and to the ministry of your own church? Everywhere you look, can't you see that "a great door for effective work has opened . . . "? Perhaps you've prepared for a career in a lucrative field. It's been a long struggle, studying for tests, preparing for interviews, and working hard in the summers to pay for it. Then you sense the call of God, calling you into fulltime Christian ministry. Not exactly the lucrative career you had in mind. Certainly "there [will be] many who oppose [you]." This is foolish, they say, you can serve God anywhere, but you know that "a great door for effective work has opened...".

For most of us, taking advantage of the opportunities God give us to serve and give don't involve life-changing decisions. It simply requires that we be ready and willing to set aside our own wants and desires, probably temporarily, and walk through that great door of opportunity.
